

# Planting the Seeds of Volunteerism



# Volunteer Trina Raether Reflects on 14 Years as a TLNC Educator

When Trina Raether and husband, Bud, moved to Eustis from Homestead in late 2002 and when getting acquainted with the area, they read a notice of a meeting of the Lake County Conservation Council. The topic was the "Chain of Lakes"—a subject somewhat



unfamiliar to a couple who had lived in close proximity to the ocean and the Everglades.

They attended the meeting and met Fran and Bernie Yokel. The couples discussed the Raethers' interest in the region and its ecology, and when Trina's background—30 years of teaching special needs students in Miami Dade County—came up, their new friends seized the moment: "We belong to Trout Lake Nature Center and we're looking for someone with teaching experience."

The following day, she received a call from the TLNC naturalist. Trina agreed to join the team, and had served as an education volunteer for a year when she was asked to become education chair. As she reflects on the moment now—and the fact that "we had a really good group of volunteers"—she says simply, "somehow, I agreed."

Fast forward to winter 2016: the educational program has expanded, with new programs and a revised curriculum. Raether, working with the TLNC board of directors, executive director and a team of dedicated volunteers revamped the curriculum and developed new field experiences for elementary school children.

Last school year, TLNC's school programs brought about 5,350 students—pre-K and kindergarten through grade 5—to the Nature Center, where they participated in age-appropriate programming that included aquifer, watershed and water quality studies.

All activities and programs are correlated to Florida education standards, and updated to comply with— and exceed—those standards.

There are many measures of the program's success. One, which brings Trina great pleasure, is when high-school or college students come back to TLNC and ask to volunteer... "because they have such positive memories of their experiences in elementary school."

### Volunteerism—Embedded in our Culture

Trout Lake Nature Center began as an ambitious dream when Oklawaha Valley Audubon Society (OVAS) volunteers embarked on an effort to purchase the 230 acres of land it now occupies. A series of yard sales, sponsored trips and various other fundraisers—planned and staffed by volunteers—provided the seed money that turned the dream into reality.

That was 27 years ago. Today a museum and nature center, with collections of preserved birds, reptiles and mammals, attract local residents and visitors from distant areas. Many walk the network of trails and boardwalks, and relax on the lakeside deck.

A multitude of educational programs, designed to appeal to ages ranging from pre-school children to their grandparents, fill each month's calendar. Our educational programs served 7,332 students this past school year.



And all of this—
as well as the
maintenance
and upgrading
of facilities and
grounds—is
made possible by
volunteers. We've
highlighted a
sampling of them
in this newsletter.
We are about
to embark on a

significant expansion, with new classroom, museum and office space, and improvements to our parking and traffic pattern. To achieve our goals, we will need to raise \$1,250,000.

I have made the decision to step aside as president of the board of directors and to focus my time and energies on the capital building campaign—working to make this audacious plan a reality. Board members—who also are volunteers—have agreed to take on new responsibilities to support this effort.

At our annual meeting in January, Stan Napier, current board secretary, has agreed to run for the office of president while, Morris Pelham, a long time director, will run for vice president. I will lend my support, running for the office of secretary. Stuart Anderson, Margie LaRoe, Ron Niebert and Horace Thompson, all directors, have agreed to run as directors and continue to serve TLNC.

I thank all the Board members for their tireless efforts and for the energy and enthusiasm they bring to Trout Lake Nature Center and the vision forTLNC's future.
